Here we introduce how you can improve your Japanese while acquiring useful daily information. Value your desire to listen, speak, and understand Japanese, and use the language a little at a time, every day.

★Make use of free leaflets and pamphlets around you


Have you ever noticed the free leaflets and pamphlets at supermarkets, convenience stores, city hall, train stations, post offices, restaurants, and many other such familiar places you use daily? They contain a wealth of information useful for daily life, such as information on discount items and convenient goods, and local events and services. You can also use them to study the lifestyles and customs of the Japanese people, as well as the Japanese language. If you come across a product, article, or word you do not understand, show the leaflet or pamphlet to people at work or people around you and seek answers to your questions. This may broaden your conversation and make for an enjoyable chat. Even if you are not yet confident about speaking in Japanese, you will find that you can use the leaflet or pamphlet to initiate a conversation.

[Supermarket]

Supermarket leaflets and pamphlets contain colorful photos of foods and household items. There may be ingredients and deli foods you have never seen before. If you find something that interests you or that looks delicious, you might want to buy it once to see how it tastes. Then, share your impression of the taste with people around you.

[Home appliances]

Japanese home appliances are world-famous. Appliance stores offer a large assortment of leaflets and pamphlets. If you find a leaflet/pamphlet for an appliance you use daily or that interests



[Travel]

Travel leaflets and pamphlets contain information and maps about various places in Japan, so you can use them to study Japanese culture and geography. By visiting a nearby tourist spot and asking questions of local people and store clerks, you might discover a new Japan!

[City hall, libraries, post offices]

There are also leaflets and pamphlets at public facilities. You might find events and convenient services that pique your interest. If you are curious about any event, go ahead and participate in it! It would be a good chance to make new friends.

Japanese Seasonal Words—Autumn "Momijigari" (Leaf Hunting)

In Japan, each of the four seasons is a showcase of beauty. Autumn is when the heat of summer abates and the air gradually grows chilly as winter nears. It is said to be the best season for eating, enjoying sports, and reading, among others. As these expressions indicate, many people look forward to autumn, such as to enjoy the seasonal foods and the cool weather that is perfect for sports.

By the way, have you ever heard the word "momijigari"? It means to enjoy viewing leaves that have changed color in autumn, with "momiji" meaning "red leaves" and "gari" meaning "hunting." The word has existed since olden times as far back as the Kamakura Period (late 12th to mid-14th centuries) when it frequently appeared in tanka poems. In those days, the act of venturing into nature to search for and enjoy the flowers and fruits of the season was expressed by attaching the suffix "-gari" to the relevant object. The culture of tasting or appreciating nature as it is has continued to this day. There is a host of similar words, including "budogari" (grape hunting) and "kinokogari" (mushroom hunting).

Leaves that change color begin to do so when the lowest temperatures at dawn drop to around 6 to 7 degrees Celsius, and they reach the peak of their color change generally in about 20 days. While the "cherry blossom front" travels from south to north, the "autumn foliage front" travels from north to south. Being

able to enjoy both cherry blossoms and the autumn foliage within the same year can be said to be one of the best aspects of Japan having four distinct seasons.


In Japan, places that are famous for their autumn foliage are mostly the grounds of temples and shrines. Their meticulously well-kept gardens are nothing short of stunning, and in some places, the foliage is lit up at night in a display of ethereal beauty. In addition to the red leaves of many deciduous trees, the leaves of ginkgo trees that have turned golden are also a sight to see, and popular leaf viewing spots attract crowds of people. Look for what autumn feature attracts you and enjoy the season!



Autumn is the season of clear blue skies as far as the eye can see. The kanji for sky (空) also has the meaning "empty," and being empty means being void of anything, so it can be thought of as a "hole." In the kanji for autumn (秋), the 禾 portion stands for rice plant, and 火, of course, means fire. Insects that come to feed on rice plants during the autumn harvest season were probably driven away using fire. In ancient times, 秌 and 穐 were used in place of 秋. 秌 means to burn with fire, and 穐 means to burn insects. "あき (呆) れた," a term expressing disbelief, and "あきら (諦)める," meaning "to give up," are not learned in primary school, but they are words frequently used in daily life.

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
